# Climate Reporting in Africa

Berlin, Germany 2 - 7 May, 2024 Discover how climate change impacts Africa and how African journalists are covering it!

# **BACKGROUND AND OBJECTIVES -**

The Study Trip of Climate Journalists from Africa to Berlin, organized by MiCT and APRI in conjunction with UNESCO for World Press Freedom Day in May 2024, aimed to enhance climate change reporting in Africa. Despite contributing less than 5% of global greenhouse gas emissions, Africa faces severe climate vulnerability and local journalists face significant barriers to reporting its effects. This platform was designed for African journalists to engage with German climate experts and media workers to exchange experiences on challenges, barriers, and opportunities for enhanced climate reporting in Africa.

The program included visits to Berlin's governmental institutions, foundations, media outlets, and NGOs, fostering dialogue on the critical role of journalism in climate change. The event, 'Climate Change Reporting in Africa: Challenges, Perspectives and Solutions' featured discussions on local and global climate narratives and the responsibilities of the Global North. It spotlighted challenges for climate reporting in Africa, as well as solutions for context-informed media to enhance societal awareness, ownership, and leadership at local and global levels.

The conference emphasized the need to humanize climate change data to motivate broader societal awareness and action. Discussions also spotlighted the scarcity of climate reporting by local journalists, underscoring the need for capacity development and access to data to support effective, accurate, free, and independent information on the impacts and solutions to climate change. Participants shared examples of innovative projects and investigative journalism efforts tracking environmental degradation and pollution in some of Africa's most vulnerable communities and ecosystems.

Panel discussions addressed challenges such as lack of resources, political interference, and the need for collaboration and strategic alliances. Attendees explored opportunities for cross-border partnerships, capacity-building initiatives, and long-term funding solutions to support sustainable climate change reporting in Africa.

# **KEYNOTE ADDRESS**



#### Vanessa Nakate

Ugandan activist and founder of Youth for Future Africa Vanessa Nakate delivered a poignant keynote address emphasizing the critical role of empathy in addressing the impacts of the climate crisis.

She highlighted the disproportionate suffering endured by regions like Turkana, Kenya, illustrated through the tragic case of Desmond, a young boy who died from malnutrition. She criticized the lack of meaningful outcomes from international climate negotiations, urging leaders to take drastic measures.

Nakate condemned the profit-driven systems perpetuating inequalities and advocated for a paradigm shift towards prioritizing people and the planet. Drawing attention to the alarming projections by the IPCC, she stressed the need for collective action to prevent the 1.5°C threshold from being surpassed and called upon Western governments to fulfill their moral obligation by divesting from fossil fuels and investing in the most vulnerable communities, underscoring the pressing need for empathy-driven action to confront the existential threat of the climate crisis.

# **PRESENTATIONS**

# Climate Investigation Stories' (Challenges and Impact) Focus on East

**Andiswa Matikinca** from The Oxpeckers Center discussed the #powertracker initiative, which scrutinizes fund allocation for renewable energy and coal projects.

**Bernard Mwinzi** from the Nation Media Group discussed Africa's ecological challenges at The Climate Story Lab Africa, emphasizing the impact of individual actions on the environment.

# Challenges of Climate Journalism in Africa: Access to Information

**Justice Baidoo** highlighted Ghana's e-waste reporting, along with the significant environmental and health risks associated with informal recycling practices. He advocated for improved regulation and sustainable management strategies.

**Afy Bobyondo Malungu** highlighted the challenges faced by African journalists in covering climate change, noting the need for independent journalism and better access to information to foster transparency and accountability.

Happy Mulolani highlighted the need to share Indigenous knowledge through media, where concepts around climate change are translated into local languages. He also emphasizes the need to amplify women's and youth's voices within farming narratives, which are often maledominated. His role as the Principal Agricultural Information Officer in Zambia underscored the importance of integrating climate reporting into government ministries.



## **PRESENTATIONS**

# "Climate Justice": Solution Journalism in Climate Journalism / Reporting

Mary Kasoka emphasized the need for a balance between solutionand challenge-oriented journalism to motivate society-wide climate action. She noted that: "It is easier to project problems over solutions when it comes to climate change reporting".

**Mamadou Touré** highlighted the challenges of reporting on climate change, underscoring the need for sustainable finance to ensure free, independent, and professional climate reporting in Africa.



**Dr. Balgis Osman Elasha** discussed the relationship between Sudan's ongoing conflict and climate change, where heightened drought, extreme rainfall variability, depletion of water sources, and desertification have been fueling social and political instability.

# UN University for Africa: Phase-Out Research, Hands-on Workshops, and Doctoral Scholarships

**Dr. Alexey Alekseenko** highlighted the UN University for Africa's multifaceted approach to enhancing climate reporting capabilities in the region, which includes conducting phase-out research, organizing handson workshops, and offering doctoral scholarships.

#### THE DISCUSSIONS

The discussions delved into the dangers and barriers faced by journalists in their pursuit of investigative stories, highlighting the critical need for greater protection and support for reporters operating in challenging environments.

Panelists emphasized the importance of fostering transparency and accountability to counter threats to press freedom and ensure the dissemination of impactful stories that address societal injustices. Panelists underscored the urgency of empowering journalists and amplifying voices to promote an equitable society.

Discussions focused on the challenges of reporting from an African perspective and touched on the potential of collaborative relationships between local and external journalists to advocate for freedom of expression. The panels also highlighted the need for resources to amplify African voices around climate change in global discourse.

# **MAIN MESSAGES**



**Empathy and Local Impact:** Addressing climate change requires empathy to understand its effects on local communities in Africa.



Fair Access to Data and Knowledge: Providing African nations with fair access to climate data to is crucial to enable informed decision-making and equitable participation in global climate discussions.



**Challenges in Climate Reporting**: There are significant barriers to effective climate reporting in Africa, including lack of training, resources, freedom of expression, and safety concerns.



**Local and Indigenous Knowledge:** There is a strong need to incorporate local and indigenous knowledge into climate strategies and communicate concepts in local languages to ensure broader understanding and engagement.



**Collaboration and Support for Journalists:** Collaboration between local and international journalists is crucial for effective climate reporting. Providing resources, training, and platforms for local journalists can enhance the quality and impact of climate stories.

# **ACTION POINTS & OPPORTUNITIES**

#### **Empowerment and Resources for Journalists**

Providing financial resources, training programs, and necessary equipment to journalists can enhance their ability to report on climate issues effectively.

#### **Collaboration and Support**

Journalists can share platforms, expertise, and equipment to access a broader network and share compelling stories about climate change.

#### **Freedom of Expression**

Providing platforms and support for indigenous people and local communities to voice their concerns about climate change can lead to more diverse and inclusive reporting on environmental issues.

## **Localized Reporting and Communication**

Journalists should focus on translating complex scientific concepts into understandable language and incorporating indigenous knowledge into their reporting to ensure that information reaches a wider audience.

#### Long-term Funding and Sustainability

Instead of relying solely on grants and competitions, establishing partnerships and securing consistent funding can ensure the viability of media outlets and enable journalists to continue reporting on climate issues effectively.

## **Critical Perspective and Solutions-Oriented Reporting**

Promoting dialogue and discussions about climate change in various spaces can drive awareness and action towards addressing environmental challenges.
