This Report is an account of the work of APRI – Africa Policy Research Institute – in 2024. APRI is an independent and nonpartisan African think tank based in Berlin, Germany. It researches key policy issues affecting African countries and the African continent. APRI aims to provide insights to the German and European Union policy-making process on Africa.

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## NOTE FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I am very proud to share with you APRI's Annual Report for 2024. It was a noteworthy year – both in the pace and breadth of our work, and in the broader context we find ourselves in as an institution. Around the world, political transitions, economic pressure points, and deepening geopolitical divides highlighted Africa's critical role in shaping complex global affairs. Whether through our work on climate justice, multi-lateral engagement and BRICS, or Africa's industrialization, APRI's aim was to contribute to global discourse and policy making with relevance, nuance, and practicable recommendations.

We were delighted to launch our **Geopolitics and Geoeconomics program** this year to understand Africa's evolving role in a multipolar world, and how the continent can shape the rules of the game. We also formally opened our office in Abuja (where six staff are now based) and hosted **an event on finance and climate action** in Nigeria, a soft launch that marked our commitment to work more closely with partners on the continent.

The launch of our **Green Transition Minerals Project** and our partnership with the Africa Minerals Development Centre were particular highlights, as was APRI's panel discussion during Africa Industrialisation Week in Addis Ababa.

Across the board, we saw renewed and in many cases increased support from our funders – a sign that the value of our work is being recognized and trusted.

We also launched the **Youth and Resilience** project, a storytelling series amplifying the voices of young Africans navigating climate change, conflict, and displacement. Through 17 powerful first-person accounts and curated podcast features (**listen here**), the project highlights both the challenges and the extraordinary agency of African youth.

Through the launch of our **Africa in the World** high-level discussion series – and its first **round-table**. In January, moderated by APRI and key-

noted by the German Development Minister – we opened up fresh conversations about the future of development cooperation. I was also honored to join a **global panel** alongside Germany's now-Finance Minister and Indonesia's Deputy Foreign Minister to discuss what the outcomes of the US elections might mean for the world.

Indeed, 2024 was a year of transition, with many pivotal changes taking place with the full implications only becoming clear in 2025. The US, EU, and Germany all faced far-reaching political changes. Africa also recorded truly historic moments: Botswana's opposition victory, South Africa's ANC losing its majority for the first time, and ongoing challenges to democratic stability in places like Gabon, Senegal and Sudan. All of this means APRI's mission is more relevant than ever: to offer grounded, nuanced, and forward-looking policy analysis that supports Africa's ability to shape its future.

In 2025, we'll be watching these developments closely, and engaging actively with the question: what do these changes mean for Africa, and how should Africa respond? Critically, we'll also undertake a strategy refresh to ensure APRI's work continues to address these questions in the most impactful way.




# APRI THOUGHT LEADERSHIP & NEWS

In 2024, APRI was featured across more than 20 media outlets, highlighting our growing influence in shaping policy conversations both in Africa and globally. From climate finance and energy transition to investment risk and geopolitical trust, the team's insights reached diverse audiences and helped advance informed debate.

Notably, in **Tagesspiegel** and **Deutsche Welle**, APRI contributed to critical discussions on how Western countries engage with the Global South and why investor confidence in Africa remains fragile. **Business Day** and **The Guardian** Nigeria spotlighted APRI's research on integrating climate action into economic planning and quantifying the cost of climate-related disasters.

This broad media presence reflects APRI's continued commitment to placing African priorities at the center of global policy conversations, and ensuring evidence-based research shapes public discourse from Abuja to Berlin.

## ECONOMY & SOCIETY

In 2024, APRI's **Economy and Society program** explored how policy decisions across Africa are shaped, and how they can be made more inclusive, evidence-based, and responsive to local realities. From industrialization to elections, green jobs and global partnerships, we combined desk research with on-the-ground insights, working closely with African authors, youth entrepreneurs, and regional stakeholders.


These diverse themes were united by a common goal: to make policy more practical, people-centered, and forward-looking. **The team produced 30 publications and held 9 events in 2024.**

### AFRICAN INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

One of the key areas of focus in 2024 was industrial development. Our **Africa Industrial Relations Series** examined industrialisation as both a strategic necessity and a political choice for African countries. The team explored how to realise the untapped potential of industrialization, highlighting **success stories** from across the continent, including **Nigeria and Morocco's cement industries**, and examining the factors behind these achievements. We also analyzed the industrial relationships between Africa, **Germany**, and **the European Union**.

Together, the series is well worth a read, providing readers with a comprehensive overview of the current state of African industrial policy relations.

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## The BRICS-Africa Thought Series

The 16th BRICS Summit, held in Kazan, Russia in 2024, was a defining moment for the bloc. Six new member states were welcomed, which meant a significant expansion of BRICS' global ambitions and a reconfiguration of geopolitical alliances. For African countries, the summit raised pressing questions about representation, influence, and strategic alignment in an increasingly multipolar world.

To support critical discussion ahead and after the summit, APRI partnered with the University of Johannesburg to launch the **BRICS-Africa Thought Series**. We convened leading African scholars and analysts to assess the implications of the summit and the opportunities and risks posed by BRICS enlargement.



The series explored how BRICS' shifting strategy is driving **demand for membership**, and **what the expanded bloc** could mean for global politics, multilateral reform, and international law.



Other topics included the viability of a common **BRICS currency**, the role of the **New Development Bank**, BRICS' relationship with **military coups**, and its positioning on **human rights** and **AI governance**.



We also looked closely at **China's growing strategic interests and influence** within the bloc, and what that means for Africa's negotiating space.

The series culminated in a **public event**, where contributors shared their reflections and discussed the future of African engagement with BRICS.

## ELECTIONS

Alongside industrial policy and global partnerships, the E&S team continued tracking major political transitions across the continent. In 2024, the biggest global election year in history, we continued our work through [APRI's Elections Hub](#), offering timely, contextual analysis of key political developments on the continent.

- [Ghana's vote and the resilience of its democratic institutions](#).



## E-GOVERNMENT

Domestic governance also remained a priority, with a focus on digital capacity and institutional modernization. We aimed to identify that's working, where gaps remain, and how digital governance can support broader development goals.

We developed a **levels-based index** that provides a comparative snapshot of where countries stand in their e-government journeys, meant as a practical tool for policymakers to benchmark progress and chart future investments.



Alongside this, we also explored **lessons from Africa's top performers**, offering insights into the policy, technical, and institutional factors that underpin successful digital government systems.



APRI and SYND organised a side event of young green tech innovators at COP29 centered on the topic of green climate technology, local innovation, and youth employment in Africa.

## GREEN TECH AND YOUTH EMPLOYMENT

Building on work from 2023, the team continued our focus on green technologies and youth employment by centering young voices and local innovation. We hosted a series of national dialogues exploring the potential of green tech for job creation, including **climate-smart agriculture in Ghana**, **electric mobility in Kenya**, and **solar mini-grids in Nigeria**.

The series culminated at COP29, where the team hosted two regional events:

- **Green climate technology, local innovation, and youth employment: Opportunities and challenges in Africa, and**
- **Localising green technology innovation: The role of the youth.**

Both events brought together youth entrepreneurs, policymakers, and private sector actors to chart more inclusive, opportunity-driven pathways for Africa's green economy.

## INFLUENCING BROADER POLICY CONVERSATIONS

In addition to its core focus areas, the E&S team contributed to a broader set of policy conversations shaping Africa's global positioning and governance. This included analysis of Africa's role in key international forums:

- From the outcomes of **FOCAC's 2024 summit in Beijing**, where Africa-China relations are being redefined in a more contested geopolitical environment, to
- South Africa's **G20 presidency**, with implications for global conversations on debt, sustainable finance, and multilateral reform.

The team also hosted an event on **private sector development in Africa's energy transition** and published a commentary offering a **reality check on the Lobito Corridor** (this commentary was one of the top downloads in 2024). Other highlights included a provocative piece on **reframing the African Union and the politics of development**, which challenged assumptions about continental integration and growth strategies.

“ With the EU and the US lagging in terms of EV technology, it is very likely that the DRC and Zambia will end up looking to the East for the capacity and capability building of EV battery value chains. ## Germany-Africa Relations

As part of this broader effort, the team built on previous work, contributing to key debates shaping the future of Germany-Africa cooperation, from development priorities to political partnerships.

We hosted a timely event on **feminist development policy**, exploring what a more inclusive, equitable approach to cooperation could look like. In a separate commentary, we examined the need to **decolonise German and EU foreign policy**, and offered practical steps to move beyond legacy frameworks.

To support a more data-driven conversation, APRI also published a visual deep dive into **Senegal-Germany bilateral relations**, providing a snapshot of one of West Africa's most prominent partnerships.

Finally, through our high-level **Africa in the World roundtable**, we opened a new space for forward-looking dialogue on the future of international cooperation, with Germany's Development Minister delivering the keynote.



## Unlocking trade infrastructure: APRI recommendations for mobilising investment

APRI's 2024 [policy brief on trade infrastructure financing](#) explores how geopolitical funding tools like the EU's Global Gateway and the G7's PGII can be harnessed to support Africa's development priorities. It offers actionable recommendations to shift from funding gaps to financing pipelines.

### OUR RECOMMENDATIONS

- ✓ Align infrastructure financing with Africa's regional and national development priorities.
- ✓ Build stronger pipelines of bankable projects through better planning and technical assistance.
- ✓ Improve access to geopolitical finance tools (e.g. Global Gateway, PGII) for African stakeholders.
- ✓ Increase transparency in project selection, fund disbursement, and implementation.
- ✓ Enhance blended finance mechanisms to crowd in private sector capital.
- ✓ Promote African agency in negotiations with external funders and development partners.
- ✓ Develop local financing ecosystems to complement international funding streams.
- ✓ Encourage cross-border infrastructure planning to support AfCFTA goals.
- ✓ Foster partnerships that prioritise long-term ownership and sustainability.



## AFRICA'S CLIMATE AGENDA

In 2024, APRI's **Africa's Climate Agenda program** team continued to champion equitable, locally grounded, and systems-level climate action across the continent. As climate impacts accelerate and global negotiations continue, we expanded our research, advocacy, and engagement across five core pillars: **adaptation, climate finance and justice, methane, youth and gender, and climate communications**.

Through publications, events, and high-level engagement, the team centered African voices in global negotiations, while supporting practical, inclusive climate solutions at national and local levels. Over the course of the year, the climate agenda team produced **19 publications** and convened **3 events**, engaging stakeholders across government, civil society, and the private sector.

### ADAPTATION

2024 marked the culmination of APRI's multi-year programme on climate change adaptation in West Africa. Building on the previous years' work, this year's efforts focused on consolidating learnings and translating them further into practical, policy-oriented outputs that can support long-term resilience in the region.

→ **Local Solutions, Global Impact** is a synthesis report drawing together findings from APRI and our respective partners' 2023 adaptation research in Nigeria, Ghana, and Senegal.

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The report highlights how community-led responses are already making a difference and offers a cross-country analysis of success factors, challenges, and opportunities for scale. Key recommendations for governments and international partners are highlighted below.

- We also published three policy briefs on **Senegal, Ghana** and **Nigeria** that translate prior research findings into actionable recommendations tailored to each country's context. **Essential reading, the briefs offer roadmaps for governments, funders, and development actors seeking to support adaptation that is not only effective but equitable and locally grounded.**



## CLIMATE FINANCE AND CLIMATE JUSTICE

While locally-led adaptation offers powerful solutions, it must be matched by global financial support. In 2024, APRI expanded our efforts to shape the broader systems of climate finance and global climate governance.

- **Our analysis of COP28** recognized historic steps like the Loss and Damage Fund but found that finance pledges fell short, just transition priorities were sidelined, and key decisions were deferred to COP29. Still, African leadership helped shape global food systems commitments.
- In the lead-up to COP29, APRI released a **series of thought pieces** advocating for a justice-first approach to climate action:
  - APRI's analysis on **green bonds** examined barriers to innovative finance.
  - **Methane Mitigation in agriculture** and **The Governance of Solar Geoengineering** raised crucial questions about overlooked risks and future priorities.
  - Notably, we also convened the event **Financing The Climate Agenda: Demands from African Countries for COP29**, which brought together African experts and negotiators to articulate a shared position on climate finance, and to highlight the financing tools most needed by the continent.
- Our policy brief **Climate Justice Inverted** critiqued the Global Shield insurance model.

## OUR WORK ON METHANE IN 2024

### What will it take to meaningfully cut methane emissions in Nigeria?

In 2024, APRI set out to help answer this question. With support from Environment and Climate Change Canada, and in partnership with Nigeria's Department of Climate Change, we mapped the country's methane landscape, covering emissions sources, financing gaps, policy barriers, and the stakeholders driving change. Our **flagship report, focused on the oil and gas sector, offers one of the most comprehensive assessments to date** and lays out a clear path toward more effective, data-driven methane reduction.

We tested and sharpened the report insights at a **national stakeholder workshop**, where policymakers, industry leaders, and civil society came together to assess what's working, where the challenges lie, and what must happen next. The result: a growing consensus on the need for stronger regulation, better data, and targeted finance.

To support this momentum, the programme team also published a **policy brief, factsheet, and commentary** to translate key findings from the mapping report into action.

Because methane is not just an oil and gas story, we widened the lens. Our **analysis of Africa's waste sector** shows how improved waste practices can reduce emissions while delivering major co-benefits for health, livelihoods, and resilience in rapidly growing cities.

**This excellent body of work by the climate team puts methane on the map as a priority for climate action and offers a roadmap for doing something about it.**

## YOUTH AND GENDER

APRI also focused on who is included (and excluded) in climate responses and our work on youth and gender put equity at the center of the climate agenda.

- The team explored how green technology can advance youth employment and economic opportunity in Africa through a **continental scoping report**.
- A separate **commentary** examined gender equity as a foundation for climate justice.



## CLIMATE CHANGE COMMUNICATIONS

Telling inclusive climate stories is as important as designing inclusive policies. That's why APRI launched a new focus area in 2024: climate communications, which ties in with our [climate jargon series](#) from 2023, and which we hope will become an ongoing work area.

Together with Media in Cooperation and Transition (MiCT) and climate journalist Angelina Davydova, we co-hosted the [Climate Change Reporting in Africa](#) program in Berlin and Potsdam from 2–7 May. The workshop brought together journalists from across the continent to exchange ideas, identify challenges, and explore new approaches to climate storytelling.

- Insights from the program shaped our publication [Telling Climate Change Stories](#), which captures journalists' perspectives and calls for more localized narratives, stronger data access, and greater investment in African climate media.

## Acting on Adaptation: What's Needed Now

Over the past two years, APRI has worked with local and national partners in Ghana, Nigeria, and Senegal to better understand what climate adaptation looks like from the ground up, and how those local strategies can shape stronger national and regional policies. The final **Adaptation Synthesis Report** outlines practical recommendations for governments and international partners to strengthen climate resilience across West Africa.

## GEOPOLITICS & GEOECONOMICS

In 2024, we proudly launched APRI's **Geopolitics and Goeconomics program**, led by **Dr. Amandine Gnanguênon**, to better understand Africa's place in a fast-changing world. As global power dynamics evolve and multipolarity takes root, our new program explores what these shifts mean for Africa, and how the continent can shape its own path through them. From energy transitions to great power competition, our team examines the challenges and opportunities that come with geopolitical and economic realignment.

Over the course of the year, the geopolitics and goeconomics team produced **8 publications**. Our insights were shared through **3 events and roundtables**, including with the European Policy Centre and Stiftung Mercator.

### GEOPOLITICS AND GEOECONOMICS IN AFRICA-EUROPE RELATIONS

Our first project, Geopolitics and Goeconomics in Africa-Europe Relations, funded by Stiftung Mercator, laid the groundwork for this work, providing a unique African perspective on European policies, discourse, and practices surrounding critical raw materials (CRM). By examining these issues through an African lens, our objective is to identify Europe's comparative advantage in resource diplomacy while also offering policy recommendations to address shared challenges between Europe and Africa.

We began by examining the rise in international mineral deals signed with African countries to explore

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how these agreements can be leveraged by governments and institutions to transform global demand into long-term development gains and advance the continent's industrialisation agenda.

- This work resulted in an [interactive map and report](#) that tracks nearly 100 bilateral and multilateral agreements between African countries and international partners on access to green and critical minerals. Read more below.

## GREEN TRANSITION MINERALS PROJECT


With support from the Open Society Foundation, APRI also launched its [Green Transition Minerals project](#) in 2024. Through publications, events, and policy conversations, we aim to equip policymakers, researchers, businesses, and civil society with the insights needed to navigate complexity and foster more balanced, mutually beneficial partnerships for Africa. Minerals like cobalt, lithium, copper, and rare earths are critical to the success of the energy transition and the future of green technology worldwide, giving African countries newfound strategic leverage. With critical minerals demand expected to grow exponentially in the coming decades, African countries are under growing pressure to position themselves in a quickly evolving global supply chain.

The project asks key questions: How can African countries use their mineral wealth to build local industries? What role should external actors play? And what policy tools can ensure these partnerships deliver real development gains?

- We zoomed in on country-level opportunities, from [Zimbabwe's lithium sector](#) to [battery production in the Copperbelt](#), showing how national and regional strategies can shape industrial outcomes.
- We also examined Africa's positioning in the global solar supply chain through our [solar PV manufacturing analysis](#).
- On policy, we analyzed how African states can navigate partnerships with the [EU](#), [UK](#), and [China](#), and explored the links between regional integration, decarbonization, and industrial development through the lens of the [AfCFTA](#).

Together, this work seeks to place African perspectives at the center of global debates on a development-focused mineral future, and to ensure that African actors shape the terms of engagement with the rest of the world.





## Mapping Africa's green mineral partnerships

Our interactive map and report tracks nearly 100 bilateral and multilateral agreements between African countries and international partners on access to green and critical minerals. It gives a visual overview of who is securing which resources, and where, helping policymakers and analysts better understand the emerging landscape of resource diplomacy. We highlight a growing trend: while African countries are increasingly entering into mineral partnerships, the transparency, equity, and development value of these agreements vary widely.

### WHAT WE LEARNED FROM MAPPING AFRICA'S MINERAL AGREEMENTS

- ✓ **Mineral partnerships are based on different factors:** They are closely linked to broader geopolitical, historical, and power dynamics.
- ✓ **China and Russia dominate:** These countries appear most frequently in agreements, while traditional mining powers like Australia and Canada are less visible.
- ✓ **Agreement types vary widely:** Some focus on direct state cooperation, others on private sector facilitation, with big differences in speed, standards, and enforcement.
- ✓ **Security and leverage:** Critical minerals are increasingly treated as national security assets, raising the stakes for how Africa asserts agency in future negotiations.
- ✓ **Transparency gaps persist:** Many agreements are non-binding and opaque, underscoring the urgent need for greater public access and accountability.
